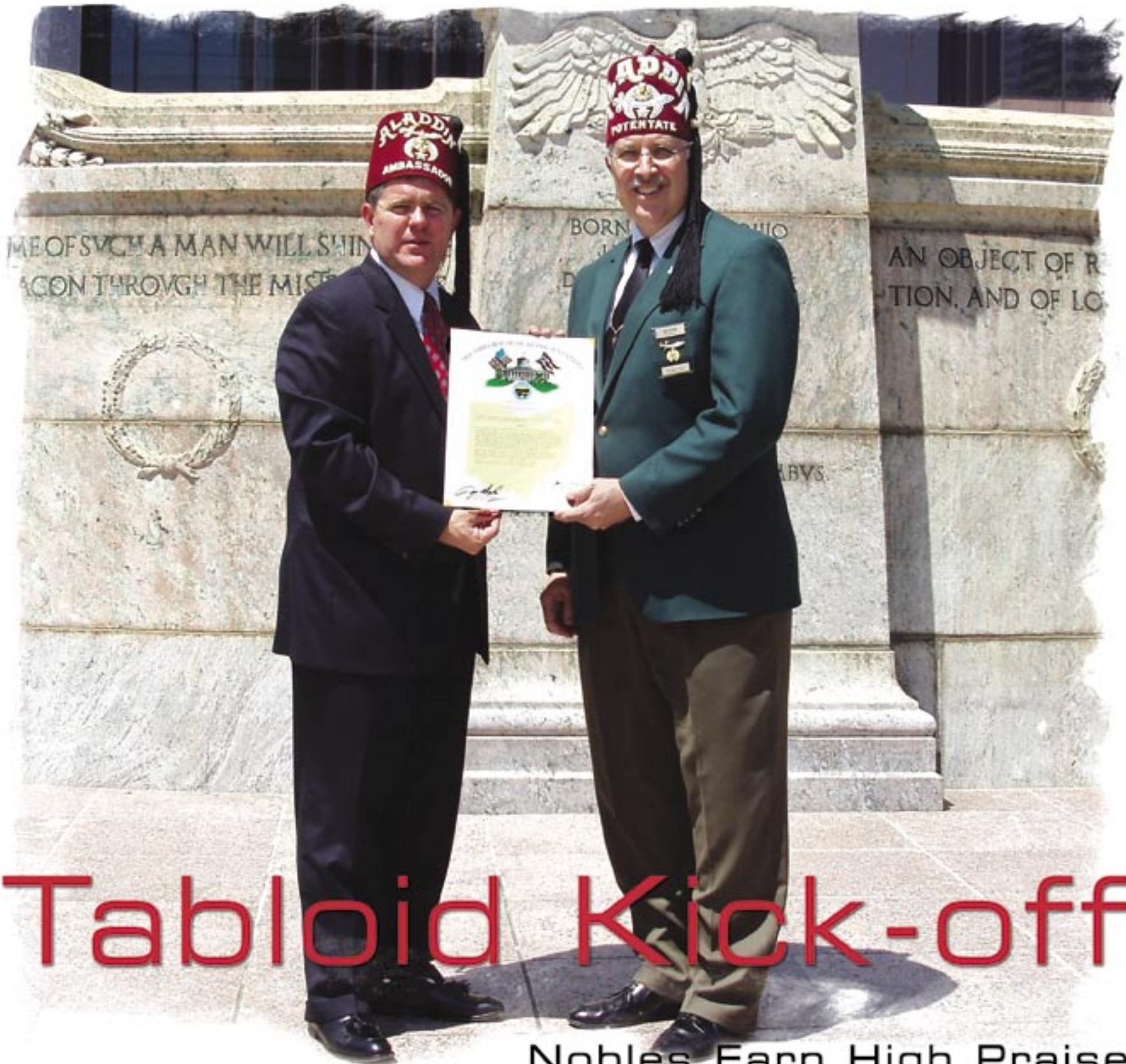

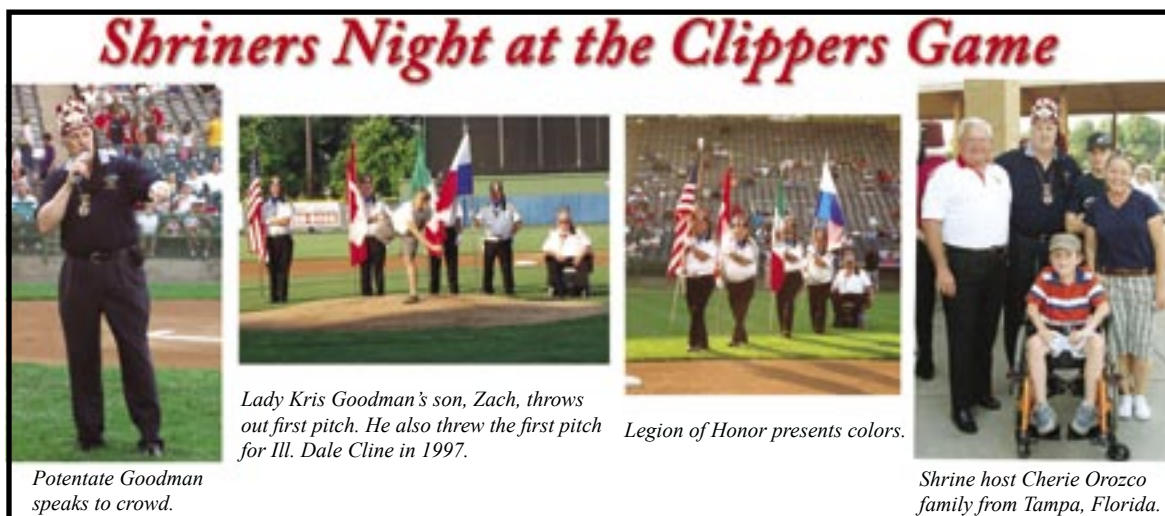

We're off to Tampa. See you in July!



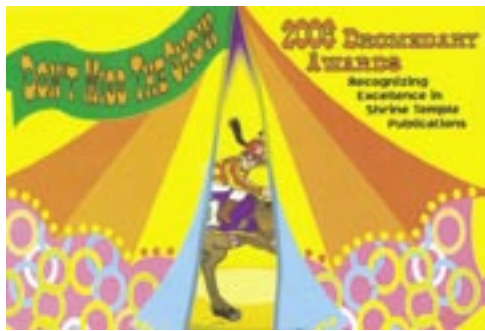
Potentate Goodman speaks to crowd.
